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STATE ASSOCIATION FOR THE PRESERVATION OF IOWA CEMETERIES BOARD MEETING, JANUARY 18, 1997 EVENT CALENDAR PRESENTED BY KEITH STREET

October 27, 1994 State Committee for the Preservation of Iowa Cemeteries formed at a meeting at Newton, Iowa. Present from Jasper County were John Daehler, Bill Ponder, Irene Zickel, Elmer Van Arkel, Beverly Cross and Marilyn Schmitt. Present from Louisa County were Eleanor Jones, William H. Matthews, Richard Lehnert, Richard Utter, Elmer Thomas, Keith Street and Dean Gipple. Loren Horton from Iowa City was also present.

November 11, 1994 A Steering Committe composed of Loren Horton, John Daehler, Marilyn Schmitt, Dean Gipple and Keith Street met at Iowa City and drew up bylaws for the organization. Michael Zahs was added to the Steering Committee on November 28, 1994.

December 2, 1994. The Steering Committee again met at Newton and adopted a draft set of rules and bylaws. It was also decided that the organization should participate in the Iowa Heritage Expo on June 9 and 10 and sponsor cemetery workshops.

December, 1994. The first Cemetery News was published, the newsletter for the organization. The second issue was published in February, 1995.

February 18, 1995. Steering Committee met at Amana. An official from the Office of the State Archaeologist discussed Iowa law regarding old burial sites. Indian burials were covered, but early pioneer burial sites also fall under that legislation.

February, 1995. Representative Barry Brauns sent a copy of a draft cemetery bill that has been introduced into the House to Dean Gipple. A letter was sent to each county Farm Bureau Policy Development Committee on behalf of our State Committee by Dean Gipple.

March, 1995. Robert and Phyllis Carter, Terry Wilson and Annabelle Wacker are added to the Steering Committee.

May, 1995. Third issue of the Newsletter published.

June 9 and 10. Heritage Expo in Des Moines. Our members presented several workshops. By July 31 membership had grown to 20.

October 7, 1995. Iowa Genealogical Society held its annual conference at Marshalltown, in conjunction with the State Committee. At a group session the State Association for the Preservation of Iowa Cemeteries was officially formed, accepted with some revisions (including the new word Association in the name instead of Committee)

the rules and bylaws proposed by the Steering Committee, and elected a Board of Trustees for the organization composed of 13 members.

January 13, 1996. The Board of Trustees met at Iowa City and elected officers to replace the temporary Steering Committee officials. Ted Sieck was elected President; Loren Horton, Vice-President; Fran Jeffers, Secretary; Keith Street, Treasurer. Dean Gipple went through the new cemetery bill and the changes made from the last one. Representative Barry Brauns is a sponsor of the bill in the House; Senator Dennis Black is a sponsor in the Senate.

March 31, 1996. Association membership has grown to 36.

May 1996. Dean Gipple spends weeks in Des Moines working for the passage of the cemetery legislation. The legislation passes. Also, Governor Ray proclaims May, 1996, as Cemetery Appreciation Month in the State of Iowa. Dean Gipple had also worked for this. Association members were in the Governor's Office for both the proclamation and the signing of the legislation; photographs appeared in several newspapers across the state.

June 1996. The Association again had a presence and workshops at the 1996 Heritage Expo held in Des Moines. The Board of Trustees met. A newsletter was sent to the membership by new editor Frances Jeffers. A second issue of Grave News was sent in late September to the membership.

September 23, 1996. The Robert L. Carter Memorial Award Committee met to draft criteria for the award and to select the first recipient of what is planned as an annual award. Dean Gipple was selected and received the award at the Iowa Genealogical Society banquet held in conjunction with the October, 1996 Conference in Iowa City

October 13, 1996. The annual membership meeting of the State Association for the Preservation of Iowa Cemeteries was held in Iowa City and re-elected three incumbent Board of Trustees members for three-year terms. The Board of Trustees re-elected the Association officers.

October 31, 1996. The third issue of Grave News was sent to members.

December 31, 1996. Charter memberships end. The Association has grown to include 76 charter memberships.

RE: The inequities in Iowa laws dealing with the protection, preservation, and maintenance of Iowa cemeteries.

A group of interested Iowa citizens, meeting in Newton, Iowa on 27 October 1994 agreed that attention needs to be given to the matter of the protection, preservation, and maintenance of all cemeteries in Iowa. At the present time all human burials 150 years old or older are protected in a more effective manner than those burials less than 150 years old. We believe that all human burials in Iowa should be accorded the same protection, regardless of the age of the remains.

In order to implement our beliefs, the group of interested Iowa citizens who met in Newton on 27 October 1994 elected a Steering Committee to draw up by-laws for collective action. That Steering Committee, consisting of the persons listed above in this memorandum, met in Newton on 11 November 1994. A draft set of by-laws was discussed, and will be revised and discussed again at a future meeting scheduled for 2 December 1994.

The Steering Committee adopted the following resolution: "All human burials in Iowa shall be accorded the same protection as presently accorded those human burials 150 years old or older." The Steering Committee consensus was that in order to effectively protect, preserve, and maintain the cemeteries of Iowa, it may be necessary to modify existing statutes, so that the physical responsibility and fiscal ability is more equitably distributed among the population. Township tax bases are presently burdened more heavily for this responsibility than are other areas of the state, and agricultural land may be bearing an unfair burden. We feel that this, and other related matters should be examined with care, to the end that all human burials in Iowa are protected, preserved, and maintained.

- I. The name of this organization shall be the STATE COMMITTEE FOR THE PRESERVATION OF IOWA CEMETERIES.
- II. The goals of this organization shall be:
 - A. To identify all cemeteries in Iowa.
 - B. To take such measures as are necessary, possible, and reasonable to protect these cemeteries and the monuments contained in them from danger, from natural causes and from human encroachment.
 - C. To provide guidance and educational materials for use by the people entrusted with the preservation of these cemeteries and the monuments contained in them.
 - D. To compile and distribute information about the proper maintenance techniques for these cemeteries and the monuments contained in them.
 - E. To provide advice and information to legislative bodies empowered to pass legislation creating a legal framework for the protection, the preservation, and the maintenance of these cemeteries and the monuments contained in them.
 - F. To act as a monitor of the administrative and management personnel of these cemeteries, to ensure that the legal measures for the protection, preservation, and maintenance of these cemeteries and the monuments contained in them are enforced.
- III. This organization shall be a membership organization. Membership is open to persons and organizations interested in the protection, preservation, maintenance, and use of cemeteries and the monuments contained in them. Organizational membership shall be considered one vote each for the purposes of voting in elections.

Annual membership fees shall be due and payable on the first day of January of each year. Dues paid on or before the October general public meeting shall be considered dues for the calendar year in which they are paid. Dues paid after the October general public meeting shall be considered dues for the following calendar year.

The amount of the annual membership fees shall be determined annually by the Board of Trustees of the organization.

IV. The Board of Trustees of this organization shall consist of no less than seven (7) and no more than ten (10) members. Members of the Board of Trustees shall be elected by the general membership at a regularly scheduled public meeting held during the second quarter of each calendar year. A quorum of the membership shall consist of those members present at the regularly scheduled public meeting, provided that at least ten (10) members are present at said meeting.

Nominations may be made by a Nominating Committee, and from the floor of the meeting. Ballot may be by voice, by a show of hands, or by paper ballot.

Voting may be for individuals or for a slate of candidates.

Election shall be by a plurality vote of the membership present, eligible and voting.

At the initial election to the Board of Trustees of this organization, all persons elected shall draw lots to determine the length of terms. At least three (3) persons shall be elected for a three (3) year term, at least three (3) persons shall be elected for a two year term, and at least one (1) person shall be elected for a one year term. In the following elections, all terms shall be for three (3) years.

All persons elected to the Board of Trustees shall be members of the organization, and must be members in good standing during their entire terms of office.

On 27 October 1994 a group of fifteen people met in Newton to discuss the desirability of forming an association to help protect, preserve, and maintain the cemeteries of Iowa. These fifteen people were drawn from the Jasper County Cemetery Commission, the Louisa County Cemetery Commission, and one other interested person. At that time the conveners of the meeting did not know of the existence of the Jackson County Cemetery Commission. Following that meeting, notice was extended to members of the Jackson County group to join in discussions.

At the 27 October meeting it was decided to appoint a Steering Committee to draft temporary rules and create a mechanism by which a state-wide group to promote the protection, preservation, and maintenance of Iowa cemeteries might be formed. Members of that Steering Committee are: John C. Daehler, Marilyn Schmitt, Dean H. Gipple, Keith Street, and Loren N. Horton. The Steering Committee was to draft goals for the proposed organization. John Daehler's address will be used as the temporary mailing address for the group. It was at this meeting also that the name "State Committee for the Preservation of Iowa Cemeteries" was chosen.

A meeting of the Steering Committee was held in Newton on 11 November 1994, attended by all five members and Michael Zahs of Washington County. At that meeting draft goals and rules were discussed and written. The advisability of changes in legislation was also discussed, and strategies for influencing the content were introduced. Also discussed were present conditions in many rural cemeteries, the present legalities of financing maintenance, and situations in other states. Other organizations which have an interest in Iowa cemeteries were also listed. These include: The Farm Bureau, the League of Women Voters, the Daughters of the American Revolution, the Iowa Genealogical Society, the Iowa Funeral Directors Association, and the Iowa Monument Dealers Association. It was felt to be desirable to keep these groups informed of our discussions and goals, and to solicit ideas from them.

The Steering Committee met in Newton on 2 December 1994 to discuss the changes in draft goals and rules. During the interim a memorandum was sent to all county Farm

Bureau organizations, explaining our concerns and the need for more enforceable legislation. At this meeting the draft goals and rules were adopted. John C. Daehler was chosen as Chairman Pro Tempore, Marilyn Schmitt was chosen as Secretary Pro Tempore, and Keith Street was chosen as Treasurer Pro Tempore. The Steering Committee agreed to participate in the Iowa Heritage EXPO, the annual meeting sponsored by the State Historical Society of Iowa, on 9 and 10 June 1995, and sponsor a cemetery track series of sessions at the EXPO. Loren N. Horton was chosen as Liaison Pro Tempore to the Iowa Heritage EXPO Planning Committee. In order to have some funds to pay for printing and postage for mailings, it was decided to temporarily set dues rates at \$20 per year for individuals and \$50 per year for organizations. Also discussed was new legislation in Maryland which seems to reflect what the Steering Committee believes would be useful in Iowa. We have requested a copy of the actual legislation from Maryland, as well as from Oregon. A letter from the Jackson County Cemetery Commission was read, in which they commend our efforts and wish to be kept informed of our progress.

Of special importance to all of us is the session at 1:30 P.M. on Saturday. We hope that all people who are interested in the protection, preservation, and maintenance of cemeteries and grave markers in Iowa will attend. Since the first meeting of interested persons, a Steering Committee has been drafting temporary rules and creating a mechanism by which a state-wide group can be formed to promote our goals. These goals were listed in the first issue of this Cemetery News, but since many of you did not receive that issue, they are reprinted here. Please come to the session at 1:30 P.M. on Saturday, 10 June, and help create the committee and affirm its goals, so that we can continue the work of protecting, preserving, and maintaining Iowa's cemeteries. Incidentally, we are defining "cemetery" to mean any place where there has been a burial of human remains.

DRAFT GOALS OF THE PROPOSED ORGANIZATION

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- A. To identify all cemeteries in Iowa.
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- C. To provide guidance and educational materials for use by the people entrusted with the preservation of these cemeteries and the monuments contained in them.
- D. To compile and distribute information about the proper maintenance techniques for these cemeteries and the monuments contained in them.
- E. To provide advice and information to legislative bodies empowered to pass legislation creating a legal framework for the protection, the preservation, and the maintenance of these cemeteries and the monuments contained in them.
- F. To act as a monitor of the administrative and management personnel of these cemeteries, to ensure that the legal measures for the protection, preservation, and maintenance of these cemeteries and the monuments contained in them are enforced.

We hope that all of you agree with these goals, or that you will come to the organizational session and let us know about your concerns. There are problems with the cemeteries and monuments in Iowa, as there are in all other states. We are presently in communication with other states where there are organizations endeavoring to do the same thing that we hope the Iowa organization will be able to do. We are also in close contact with the Office of the State Archaeologist, which is the agency empowered with the investigation and protection of "Ancient Burials" in Iowa. Section 263B.7,8, and 9, Section 716.5, and Section 685.11.1 of the Code of Iowa currently provide protection for burials more than one hundred fifty years old. This does little to help protect the more

recent burials that are eliminated to make way for parking lots, buildings, roads, cultivated fields, and other developmental uses. The people who first met to discuss the idea of a statewide organization all felt that there are solutions to the problems, and that collectively we can bring some of these solutions to fruition.

Of course we hope that all of you will be interested in all of the sessions dealing with cemeteries and gravemarkers. But the one scheduled for 1:30 P.M. on Saturday, 10 June will be crucial to the formation of a viable state organization.

We should note here that you must register for the conference in order to attend any of the sessions. This is the annual meeting of the State Historical Society of Iowa, and participation is by registration for the conference as a whole. If you are interested in attending, be sure that your name is on the mailing list. To ensure that, contact Lynda Wessel, Iowa Heritage EXPO Coordinator, State Historical Society of Iowa, Capitol Complex, Des Moines, Iowa 50319, telephone (515) 281-5229. She will be happy to put you on the mailing list to receive registration materials.

THE COALITION TO PROTECT MARYLAND BURIAL SITES, INC. has developed a legislative agenda that has already produced some changes in the state laws. Among the general principles which they have endorsed are:

- 1. The necessity of access to burial sites.
- 2. Appropriate disposition and treatment of human remains and associated funerary objects.
- 3. Abolition of illegal trading of grave goods.
- 4. Prevention of burial site desecration and no unauthorized disturbance of burial sites or removal of human remains.
- 5. Definition of what is meant by "abandoned cemetery".
- 6. Need for the existence of an entity at the local level to intervene when situations and problems occur.

The Coalition has also persuaded the governor of Maryland to issue a proclamation declaring the week of May 24-31 as "Family Remembrance Week". Among the points mentioned in the proclamation are:

"Whereas, This week also encourages efforts to locate, care for, and honor the burial sites of family members of yesteryear - and to visit places which have figured significantly in our respective family histories; and Whereas, Maryland is pleased to join with the Coalition To Protect Maryland Burial Sites in celebrating the importance of family ties and family heritages, as keeping the spirit of the past alive will surely benefit our families in the future.

As you can see, many of the ideas and activities of the Maryland organization parallel what we propose to do in Iowa. The State Committee for the Preservation of Iowa Cemeteries is now a member of the Maryland organization, and will exchange newsletters with them. For more information about the changes in the Maryland laws, achieved and proposed, come to the EXPO meeting in Des Moines in June. Each member of the SCPIC Steering Committee has a copy of the new Maryland laws which went into effect in October 1994.

The package of material from Maryland arrived on 25 January 1995. I am enclosing a bit of it for you, and will you show you the rest of it when we meet on Saturday, 18 February 1995. And I will let you know the specific place to meet in Amana in a later memorandum.

As you can tell from the note on the enclosed photocopy, this information is about the legislation that <u>was passed</u> and went into effect in 1994. They have a long legislative agenda that they hope to push in 1995, but we can look at that at the meeting. Personally, I am most interested in how they define "person of interest" for access to burial sites. I think we might very well copy that definition in our own proposals. And besides that, it requires consultation with a local "burial sites advisory board" and that sounds very much like a county cemetery commission to me.

I am also enclosing a tentative schedule for the "Cemeteries and Grave Markers" sessions at the Iowa Heritage EXPO. We have a session for every time slot, if everyone shows up. I have not yet heard from Paul Maddy, but everyone else has responded affirmatively.

So far I have not had time to get out the next issue of the newsletter, but it should be ready for mailing well before our meeting on 18 February. You are brave to trust me with the contents of it, but I haven't gotten any submitted articles from any of you, so that must be what you are doing.

The copy was sent to Dean Gipple by Representative Barry Brauns. Dean has talked to Representative Brauns, and apparently the draft bill is a result of those conversations. It did not have a House file number on it yet, so I have not determined its status. I shall try to find out if it has been assigned a file number, and what is happening to it.

Please read the draft bill and see if it fits the goals of the State Committee for the Preservation of Iowa Cemeteries. If so, then we might want to encourage the members of the committee. I have read it and find nothing objectionable in it. Of course it does not cover all of the points in our list of goals, but we never imagined that one bill would do that. As soon as I find out this draft bill has a file number, I will let you know. You can then decide whether or not, as individuals or as a Steering Committee, we should make known to the House Committee members our interest in such legislation.

To be sent to each county "Policy Development Committee" of the Iowa Farm Bureau Federation One hundred fifty years ago, the population of Iowa was 85% rural, and a Township Trustee system was established. Responsibilities included taking care of roads, viewing fences, putting up quarantine signs, and taking care of cemeteries. Taxes were levied on township agriculture land valuation. Legislation has been introduced that would create a five-person Pioneer Cemetery Commission. This group, to be appointed by the Governor, would assist in coordinating restoration, renovation, and maintenance of pioneer cemeteries, recommend projects and funding to the legislature, obtain grant funding and legislative appropriations, and recommend changes in the law to help protect pioneer cemeteries as a part of Oregon's heritage. The Oregon Cemetery Association has asked the Oregon Historic Cemeteries Association to co-sponsor a proposed bill which would make cemetery vandalism a felony. Governor Kitzhaber was asked to declare May 1995 as "Cemetery Appreciation Month".

THE COALITION TO PROTECT MARYLAND BURIAL SITES, INC. NEWS AND ACTIVITIES

Five new legislative proposals have been made this year. These include: "Disposition and Treatment of Discovered Human Remains and Burial Sites"; "Desecration of, or Unauthorized Removal of, Funerary Objects Associated with Burial Sites - Prohibition"; "Desecration and Unauthorized Disturbance of Burial Sites - Prohibition"; "Authorization for Disturbance of Burial Sites - Conditions and Provisions"; and "Maintaining Records of the Disinterment and Reinterment of Human Remains." Last year 2 of the 4 proposals made became law.

DRAFT GOALS OF THE STATE COMMITTEE FOR THE PRESERVATION OF IOWA CEMETERIES

The goals of this organization shall be:

- A. To identify all cemeteries in Iowa.
- B. To take such measures as are necessary, possible, and reasonable to protect these cemeteries and the monuments contain in them from danger, from natural causes and from human encroachment.
- C. To provide guidance and educational materials for use by the people entrusted with the preservation of these cemeteries and the monuments contained in them.
- D. To compile and distribute information about the proper maintenance techniques for these cemeteries and the monuments contained in them.
- E. To provide advice and information to legislative bodies empowered to pass legislation creating a legal framework for the protection, the preservation, and the maintenance of these cemeteries and the monuments contained in them.
- F. To act as a monitor of the administrative and management personnel of these cemeteries, to ensure that the legal measures for the protection, preservation, and maintenance of these cemeteries and the monuments contained in them are enforced.

PLEASE BRING A COPY OF THESE GOALS WITH YOU TO THE JUNE 10 MEETING IN DES MOINES, FOR DISCUSSION AND ADOPTION.

THE ANNUAL MEETING OF THE WISCONSIN STATE OLD CEMETERY SOCIETY WAS HELD IN WEST ALLIS ON 8 APRIL 1995.

This group has an archives which contains the county burial stone records, as copied by volunteers and sent in to the office. These are shelved in alphabetical order by county. Individual county records are divided by township, and then by individual cemeteries or burial sites. The WSOCS will host the Milwaukee Metropolitan Wisconsin Council for Local History meeting on 16 September 1995.

The Cemetery Committee of the Ohio Genealogical Society is sponsoring legislation which would provide for the "decent reburial of human remains", and combines the interest of Native American Indians and all other burials more than 125 years old. Legislation has been passed which increases the penalties for vandalism. And they hope to change the Code term from "body" to "human remains" to make it easier to protect old burial sites.



Neither of these examples is from Iowa, so don't drive around trying to find them.





IN THE LAST SESSION OF THE IOWA GENERAL ASSEMBLY, A DRAFT BILL WAS INTRODUCED IN THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES PERTAINING TO CEMETERIES.

The bill was entitled "An Act relating to the control and maintenance of township cemeteries and abandoned cemeteries by the county board of supervisors". The wording was as follows:

Section 1. <u>NEW SECTION</u>. 331.325. CONTROL AND CARE OF TOWNSHIP CEMETERIES AND ABANDONED CEMETERIES -- CEMETERY COMMISSION.

- 1. A county board of supervisors, on its own motion or upon receipt of a petition meeting the requirements of section 331.306, may adopt an ordinance assuming jurisdiction and control of the township cemeteries and abandoned cemeteries in the county. If an ordinance is adopted as provided in this subsection, the board shall exercise the powers and duties relating to the establishment, maintenance, and repair of cemeteries in the same manner as provided for township trustees in sections 359.28 through 359.41.
- 2. In lieu of management of the cemeteries, the board of supervisors may create, by ordinance, a cemetery commission to assume jurisdiction and management of the township and abandoned cemeteries in the county. The ordinance shall specify the number of commissioners, the appointing authority, the term of office, officers, employees, organizational matters, rules of procedure, compensation and expenses, and other matters deemed pertinent by the board. The board may delegate any power or duty related to cemeteries which may otherwise be exercised by the township trustees in sections 359.28 through 359.41 to the cemetery commission except that the board shall retain the power to approve or disapprove any tax levy certified by the cemetery commission.

Section 2. <u>NEW SECTION</u>. 359.2 COUNTY ASSUMPTION OF CEMETERY DUTIES.

If the county board of supervisors assumes the jurisdiction and management of township cemeteries and abandoned cemeteries as provided in section 331.25, the township trustees remain responsible for the buildings and public grounds, excluding cemeteries, as provided in sections 359.28 through 359.41, and may levy taxes pursuant to section 359.30 for those purposes.

The entire membership shall be notified of the date and place of this general public meeting at least one (1) month prior to the date of the meeting. This notification shall be by mail.

This organization may hold as many additional general public meetings as seems to fit the goals and needs of the organization. Upon the request of no fewer than ten (10) members in good standing of the organization for a special meeting, such a special meeting shall be scheduled. Notification of the date and location of such a special meeting shall be by the same procedure as that used for the a general public meeting. A request for a special meeting must be made in writing.

- VIII. All proposed amendments to the documents of governance of this organization must be submitted in writing, and presented to the Board of Trustees prior to September 1 of the year in which they are to be considered. These proposed amendments will be placed on the agenda to be voted on at the annual meeting next after the 1 September when they are submitted to the Board of Trustees. Any member in good standing may prepare and submit amendments.
- IX. Prior to the official adoption of these rules, the Steering Committee shall handle all business of the organization. The Steering Committee shall adopt its own rules of operation prior to the official adoption of these rules.





At the Board meeting in Des Moines on 7 June 1996 it was assigned to me to find a place to hold the annual meeting, which was planned to coincide with the annual meeting of the Iowa Genealogical Society in Iowa City. I was not able to get a meeting place at the Iowa Memorial Union, where the actual sessions of the IGS will be held. Instead, I have arranged for the SAPIC annual meeting to be held at the Country Kitchen Restaurant at 2208 North Dodge Street, Iowa City. This restaurant is located just south of the intersection of Interstate 80 and Iowa highway 1, and is in the old Howard Johnson's building. It is adjacent to the Country Inn, one of the alternative lodging places noted in the publicity for the IGS meeting. To reach the restaurant from the Interstate, take the Iowa highway l exit towards town. You will then pass an athletic club on the right and American College Testing on the left. Turn right and you will be in the parking lot of the Country Kitchen Restaurant and the Country Inn motel. There is plenty of parking. I have reserved a private room for us with a seating capacity of about 25. Of course it is possible that we will have more people in attendance than that. We will have to decide at that time what to do about accommodating a larger attendance. This room is available at no cost to us if the amount of food ordered amounts to \$25.00 or more.

CARTER MEMORIAL AWARD. Those SAPIC members who wish to attend the banquet must register with the IGS. For attendance at the banquet only, the IGS cost is \$20 plus \$10 late charge. Please contact the Iowa Genealogical Society, P. O. Box 7735, Des Moines, Iowa 50322-7735 for tickets to the banquet or any other information about the IGS meeting.

The Robert L. Carter Memorial Award Selection Committee met on 23 September 1996, drafted criteria for the award, and selected the first winner, as instructed by the Board at the June meeting. The award will be made at the IGS banquet on Friday evening, October 11, and the draft criteria will be presented to the Board and membership at the SAPIC annual meeting on Saturday morning, October 12.

If anyone has any questions about any of the above information, please call me at my home telephone, 319-351-5842. I will post notices about the place of our meeting at the IGS meeting on Friday, and I will announce the place of our meeting at the banquet on Friday evening. In the meantime, if you are in contact with any of the SAPIC members, individual or organizations, please let them know where and when our annual meeting will be. If we run into a real problem about the size of the meeting room, capacity about 25, you can blame me and then never ever trust me to do anything again. It was the best I could do.

ARTICLE IN THE MAY 1996 IGS NEWSLETTER

Many individuals across Iowa, as well as others nationwide, have fought battles over the maintenance and preservation of the grave sites and markers of their pioneer ancestors. It is a disgrace that there are so many abandoned and untended graves and cemeteries in every Iowa county, where no one takes responsibility for the upkeep.

Jasper, Clinton and Louisa Counties formed cemetery commissions to bring attention to such cemeteries and provide them with minimal maintenance and repair.

Representatives of the Jasper and Louisa commissions, with Loren Horton and other interested individuals, met at Newton in December of 1994 and formed the State Association for the Preservation of Iowa Cemeteries. The objectives would be to focus attention on the need to protect, preserve and maintain Iowa cemeteries.

The most recent accomplishment was on April 2, this year, when Governor Terry Branstad signed a proclamation setting a Pioneer Cemetery month to honor the memories and resting places of our Iowa pioneer ancestors. Association members were invited to the signing of the proclamation.

The Association has been instrumental in supporting new legislation designed to make elective officials responsible for the care and maintenance of pioneer graves and cemeteries. A bill introduced in the Iowa Legislature defines a pioneer cemetery as one where there have been fewer than six burials in the last 50 years. The Association is also seeking to equalize the tax base for cemetery support and reduce the present unfairness which forces a small township to financially support an urban cemetery.

Ted Sieck, of Irwin, is the Association president; Loren Horton, of Iowa City, is vice-president; Frances Jeffers, of Decorah, is secretary; Keith Street, of Wapello, is treasurer.

Dues are \$20 per year. Those joining in 1996 will still be considered as charter members. AWARD CRITERIA STATE ASSOCIATION FOR THE PRESERVATION OF IOWA CEMETERIES

- 1. The award shall be called the Robert L. Carter Memorial Award.
- The Robert L. Carter Memorial Award shall be given only once each year.
- 3. The State Association for the Preservation of Iowa Cemeteries President shall appoint an <u>ad hoc</u> committee of the Board of Trustees to act as an Awards Selection Committee. This Awards Selection Committee shall serve a term of one year, although individual Board members may be appointed to it for succeeding years.
- 4. The Award Selection Committee shall come to a decision prior to each State Association for the Preservation of I A Cemeteries annual meeting as to whether or not an award shall be given that year, and if so, to whom or what.
- 5. The Award Selection Committee shall make its recommendation to the full Board of Trustees at the Board meeting immediately preceding the State Association for the Preservation of Iowa Cemeteries annual meeting.
- 6. Eligibility for the Robert L. Carter Memorial Award:
 - a. any individual, group, association, organization, institution, or governmental agency or unit is eligible for consideration.
 - b. to be considered for the award, a nominee must have demonstrated an achievement or activity above and beyond what is expected under ordinary circumstances.
 - c. a nominee must have been involved in or responsible for an achievement or activity that significantly extends or expands the education about preservation, protection, maintenance, appreciation, or understanding of Iowa Cemeteries, grave yards, burying grounds, single burials, monuments, tombs, mausoleums, grave markers or other aspects of material culture related to or associated with Iowa cemeteries.
 - d. one award may be given for service; one award for cemetery education.
- 7. Any member of the State Assoc. for the Preservation of Iowa cemeteries, including Board members, may nominate persons or other eligible recipients as described in 6 A.
- 8. Members of the State Association for the Preservation of Iowa Cemeteries, including Board members, are eligible to receive the Robert L. Carter Memorial Award.
- 9. Nominations for the Robert L. Carter Memorial Award shall include the following in order to be eligible:
 - a. a letter naming the nominee that summarizes the relevant achievement or activity, and signed by the nominator.
 - b. at least one letter of support from a person or group other than a member of the State Assoc. for the Preservation of Iowa Cemeteries.
 - c. appropriate supporting materials such as photographs, newspaper articles, printed matter, or other documentation explaining the relevant achievement or activity and its significance.



. Grave of a Slave

One of the oldest cemeteries in Winneshiek County is that of the Hesper Public Cemetery.

Among the many persons interred within its bounds include one person that was born two years before George Washington became president of the United States. There is a soldier who fought in the War of 1812; a nurse who served in the Civil War; a victim of a murder in the area; a slave from the south who found his way north through the underground railroad during the Civil War; the founder of the village of Hesper; a detective from the Detective Agency from Chicago; three victims of a flood, just to name a few

Hesper was founded in 1851 when the first settler, E.E. Meader arrived in the area from Indiana. Russell Taber, a native of Vermont, was the founder of

the village in 1857.

In 1857 the first grave that has a marker, is that of Lydia Wickersham, age 8 months and 11 days who died June 20 of that year.

Abram West, born April 4, 1787, two years before George Washington was elected president of the United States, is the oldest person buried there. His wife, Anna, born in 1799, the same year as Washington died, is buried at his, base by fern-type leaves, stands the sidc.

Henry Walton Gates, born in 1790, served with the New York Militia in the War of 1812 and died at Hesper in 1863, is the oldest veteran buried there. Veterans of the Civil War are numerous, surpassing the veterans of World War I + Camp. It has withstood vandalism and and II. Cynthia Worth Cameron is the the element for the past 83 years. It only person to serve as a nurse during the War between the States, serving with Company A of the 18th Iowa Infantry at Jefferson Barracks, MO.

A slave, Nels Nelsheim, found his way north from the state of Mississippi during the Civil War through the underground railroad, to the home of E.E. Mcader, for whom he worked. He died in 1877 at the age of 43. His grave is set off from the rest in remote section in the northwest corner.

Mary Cater, 44, one of two people murdered at Burr Oak on Sept. 1, 1894, is in the Cater family piot. Cater was murdered along with George Wemett, in a murder that rocked northeastern Iowa nearly a century ago. Her husband, John D. Cater, was convicted of Wemett's murder and sent to prison, while the fate of Mrs. Cater remains

Jonas Wellington and his wife, Cornelia and their grandson, Charles Gage, were among the victims of the Wiesel flood in Fillmore County on August 6, 1866. Wellington was also a Civil War veteran.

Col. George Dellingham, a detective for the Police Patrol and Detective Agency of Chicago, often referred to as Hesper's "mysterious man", lies in an unusual grave. Prior to his death in 1905, Dellingham made a request that his Bible, the American flag and his pistol be buried with him. He also requested that his grave be brick-lined and after his coffin was placed in this receptacle, that iron bars be laid over the casket and then covered with brick and

During his 29 years residency in Hesper, he would often disappear riding a white horse with a gun at his side and would be gone for long or short periods of time.

A native of St. Alban's Main, he' taught school, served as a private in the Civil War and at times even filled the pulpit at the Hesper Friends Church.

There are many unique monuments of various sizes and descriptions, which revive old legends or stories. Some tell of military history, others of a profession or a hobby that was pursued.

The Robert McMillen family has a red polished marble 12-foot monument, resembling a colonnade similar to one of the royal mosques in Ishahan.

Testifying to her artistic ablility, Sattie Worth has a small unimposing grey monument on which a painter's palette is carved.

Like the trunk of a large tree deprived of its branches and surrounded at the monument to Hon. Horace B. Williams, a native of Batavia, NY, who arrived in Hesper in 1858. He served four terms in the Iowa State Legislature.

A tool shed, patterned after a Chinese pagoda, was erected in 1905 by Will stands just south of the entrance gate.

The Hesper Cemetery Association was organized on June 11, 1904 at Tabor's Hall. Present officers are Fay Harvey, Pres.; Bernard White, Vice Pres.; Burr Griswold, Secy., and Robert Street,

Mom sues cemetery over son's injuries

DAVENPORT (AP) - A Quad-Cities woman is suing a Davenport cemetery where a 300-pound tombstone fell on her 3-year-old son, resulting in severe brain damage.

In a lawsuit filed in Scott County District Court, Julia Wilson, 27, of Rock Island, Ill., alleges that the owners of Oakdale Memorial Gardens should have known their facility "posed a significant risk of serious personal injury" to her son and other members of the public.

She also accuses the cemetery of negligence for failing to correct the "dilapidated, unstable condition and state of disrepair" of many of the monuments on the cemetery grounds, according to the lawsuit.

Wilson was pulling weeds Oct. 9, 1995, at the cemetery under the terms of a court-ordered community service sentence.

Her son, Keith, was playing on a 6foot-7-inch grave marker when it toppled over, fracturing his skull in five places and breaking two vertebrae.

Wilson was able to lift the obelisk off the boy and pull him free. She then drove him to a nearby hospital.

After receiving extensive treatment at University Hospitals in Iowa City, Keith was brought back home. But he remains unconscious.

Jim Weerts, president of Oakdale Memorial Gardens, declined comment on the lawsuit.

"That's for the courthouse," he said. "I don't intend to try this in the paper. ... It will be properly tried in the courts.

"It was just an unfortunate accident." Wilson is seeking unspecified damages.

TO ALL MEMBERS OF THE STATE ASSOCIATION FOR THE PRESERVATION OF IOWA CEMETERIES:

As I complete my term as president of the State Association for the Preservation of Iowa Cemeteries, I must admit that there is far more to be done that I had initially anticipated. In many areas, we have not been as effective as we could have been, but we have made a start!

The challenges lie in at least three important areas:

(1) Membership Development. While I am concerned that we get as many people as possible involved in cemetery preservation (such as every genealogist, local historian, cemetery official, etc.), this is not my concern at this moment. It is, rather, the development of a functioning network of people who can help each other, serve as resource people, and keep the needs of all Iowa cemeteries, especially those where our pioneers are buried, in the public eye.

I believe that it is mandatory that we develop area "chapters" (for lack of a better word), so that the resources of the organization are available to each member and cemetery organization. In some areas, this may be a county group, but perhaps we could start by targeting each district of the Iowa Genealogical Society, cultivating members in each district to serve as liaison/resource people to county boards and other legislative bodies, cemetery organizations, and all other interested persons.

(2) Education. Some kind of program should be instituted to make the general public aware of the need to protect and restore our (pioneer) cemeteries. Perhaps we could submit well-written articles to newspapers, historical/genealogical newsletters, etc. Broadcast media is another area that needs investigation. We must get the word out! Iowa can take the lead in cemetery preservation, protection, and appreciation!

A seminar---or better still a series of seminars---should be developed to equip our members in the various areas in which their input is needed (public awareness, legal issues, "hands on" cemetery restoration, etc.) Until every member is well versed in the goals and methods of the organization, we will continue to be only a "fringe" group, and thus we will not reach peak effectiveness.

Not only must we develop our own newsletter into an dynamic publication worthy of the public's attention, but we should also consider some kind of a legislative newsletter to inform, challenge, and encourage our legislators, and to express our appreciation for their efforts.

(3) Legislation. Thanks to the extraordinary efforts of Mr. Dean Gipple, we have legislation permitting county boards to take action in preserving pioneer cemeteries. Our organization owes him a great debt of gratitude for those efforts!

As mentioned above, we must keep the needs of our cemeteries ---all of them!---before our legislators. There are areas in "our" bill that will need attention, and perhaps change as time goes by. It is a great start, but we must do more!

Laws should be passed to establish harsher penalties for cemetery desecration. Access to cemeteries needs to be more clearly defined. Public ownership of all burial sites should be assured. No longer can we allow old gravestones to be piled against a fence or buried, so that more crop land is available for the "owner" of the land!

I call your attention to the enclosed material by Paul Maddy. He has done us a great service in preparing it, and I am sending a copy to each of you, hoping that you will thoughtfully consider what both Mr. Maddy and I have to say, and then that you will come to our meeting ready to discuss what we have written, as well as your own insights and suggestions.

I would hope that the members of our organization can come together and enhance the public's awareness of the special heritage of our pioneer cemeteries. The challenge is great, but we can meet it!

SUBJECT: Committee Challenges

For all the responsibilities, or the opportunities before us, our occasional meetings give us insufficient time for all the challenges we have. Anyway, I missed the last meeting, regrettably due to my own error.

As we look ahead at the problems and the opportunities, each of you are probably doing some thinking about what should be on our agenda.

Here are some of my thoughts about possible agenda items. I am routing these through our president so that (1) his agenda concerns and the overall interests of the committee are not unduly distorted by just one member; (2) he can borrow what he wants from this draft to add to his present thoughts and his vision of near-term planning priorities for our committee.

This is not a message about what I think I can do so long as the Commission blesses the start. Near the end I identify where I think my efforts should be. So most of this is thought about what should be on the agenda for everyone to share in, to struggle with.

INTRODUCTION:

When THE NEW BILL had just been passed, Mr. Gipple called me with a question. (What were my thoughts about) how my presentation could be seen and heard by all Boards of Supervisors in Iowa?

It was a flattering question, and I appreciated it. But my first action was to congratulate Mr. Gipple for his stunning "over-night" success in getting a bill through in just one year. But of course Mr. Gipple had been preparing for over-night success his whole life, and especially in his retirement years.

INFORMATION TO BOARDS OF SUPERVISORS - AND BY WHAT METHODS:
Later I shared with my family Gipple's compliment-question. Our
Des Moines daughter works for the Governor's office on state-wide
health care information/education issues. She offered an immediate
answer to the question. "You and the Committee are going to use
the new State Fiber-Optic TV Network, aren't you?" (She has.)
Hmmm. On target! But if so, then what messages on that medium and
when? These concerns can become agenda items for us. But first,
yours:

YOUR AGENDA CONCERNS:

Now with some possible duplication, I'll add others of mine.

ANTICIPATE SLOW IMPLEMENTATION RATE:

The new law is not mandatory. That wasn't politically possible. It is permissive. Boards of Supervisors CAN do this OR NOT. But why would they not do this?

To us it seems logical that Boards would soon go our way. But early on we shall probably find most Boards will not rush to adopt our vision of the problems and the solution. Why not?

A short answer. Board members are like other people, other Iowans. It is my 10-year finding that people have been and are "handcuffed"

by a number of beliefs, or understandings, or "facts" that are not true. My belief: if this were not so, we probably would not have so much accumulated neglect in our rural cemeteries. A mere brief listing here of these erroneous "facts" will probably not convince. You will need to have my free presentation in your community and/or read my book.

Certainly we will be grateful to those Boards who do act favorably soon. AND I suggest we will want to tap into their reasons when counties do act, AND circulate these reasons statewide to other Boards. The rest of the prescription will be "Repeat as needed." Probably for several years we will need to take advantage of the info in every county that acts. If so, all of this means a series of newsletters. What do you think? Yes or no? What else?

NEWSLETTERS AND ____:

VCR presentations -- not one but several? VCR presentations of what? This leads me back to Mr. Gipple's question and an important partial answer.

THE COMMITTEE'S MESSAGE IS _____:

Maddy's presentation alone will probably NOT achieve what you and the Committee want to accomplish. This Committee needs its own voice, its own message. As already stated earlier in the year, the Committee is free to borrow what concepts it likes from Maddy's book themes in creating its own message.

INPEDIMENTS TO EARLY ACTION:

Besides the needs of everyone for fuller understanding of essential facts and paralyzing fictions, what else impedes? Boards of Supervisors no doubt have full agendas. It is hard for any organization to just set policies. My guess (just a guess) is that Boards of Supervisors don't find enough time "for everything". Anyway, their agendas are prepared by the auditors who are secretaries to the boards. So isn't it the auditors who are high on our list of targets for better understanding of rural cemetery problems and solutions?

AUDITORS AND SUPERVISORS AS COMMITTEE MEMBERS:

Maybe I am not correct in this, but if I am, then I suggest we want to be inviting into our membership supervisors and ex-supervisors, auditors and ex-auditors to help us shape our messages and strategies—and to be important avenues of communications, not just

in the near future, but over the years as we will again, again and again be spreading the word, educating, informing. Possible issue: Full working membership - or advisory - or . . . their choice - or . . .?

But the analysis above is based on my assertions. Am I approximately correct or off target? I expect President Sieck will appreciate it if you contact friends who are auditors or ex, supervisors or ex, and affirm or deny the assertions here, and bring that information to the Committee for tally.

VCR MESSAGES:

VCR - very easy to print 3 letters. But it will not be easy to get good ones produced. But once a good VCR is produced, copies can convey essential information in many places at the convenience of the audience as they are assembled for their regular meetings with the VCR tape message an extra feature. Once a good message is produced, then can it be shown in a lot or all counties at the same time via the State's new fiber-optic network?

VCR TARGET AUDIENCE:

Would a VCR message be only for Boards of Supervisors and Auditors? I suggest it should be one that any and all of us could take anywhere and everywhere so that the public learns what the cemetery needs are. Then the public and can tell Boards of Supervisors what action they believe best for pioneer cemeteries.

QUALITY AND PRODUCER:

But I also envision a VCR message that is professionally polished and complete enough in text and message so that it does NOT require us to be presenters and translators of the VCR messages. That, I think, would have to be the standard for use over the fiber-optic network.

Question: Who should produce the text? I have no doubt the draft text can be produced by this committee, probably polished by a skilled editor.

But we must clearly see that "how to do gravestone restoration" is NOT where to start with our problem; therefore it should not be the subjects of our first messages. Our first messages and repeats have to deal with the why--why the past and present system is so inadequate to preserve our heritage.

Question: Who should then produce the VCR? My view is that the production should not be by amateurs (us).

THEN GET STARTED ON A "HOW TO DO IT" VCR:

Twice in recent years I have participated in attempts to get my gravestone restoration field-day techniques onto VCR. Both times, noise (distant truck noise and farm tractor noise) botched the attempt. It is now clear to me that the audio should go on after the "how to do it" tape is produced and edited, at least most of it. Professional guidance expected.

It is clear to me now that the photography of the demonstration of techniques will need to be at times arranged just for the photography. Most of it cannot be accomplished during public demo events.

There is a great need for a "how to do it VCR".

FUNDING:

If after thoughtful sifting of everyone's input some of my thoughts are still on your agenda, then funding possibilities become a top agenda item. Realistically, some facts on this will help shape the decisions on what VCR messages would be initiated.

IN CONCLUSION:

I'll say it again. Regarding any messages to everyone or to all Boards of Supervisors about the why, I think the Committee should find its own voice, its own message -- the voice of you, you and you. Meanwhile, (a) my Cemetery Demonstration Days, (b) plus more research on methods, and (c) in-door slide programs around the state are where my efforts should continue to be.

YOUR AGENDA CONCERNS:





WHAT CAN WE DO?

Suggestions made by Bill Lemke were to seek support from the following groups: 1. Farm Bureau Women's division as a project; 2. Federated Women's Clubs project--Rural Women's Study Clubs project; 3. League of Women Voters project; 4. 4-H, FFA, Boys and Girls Scouts groups as a citizenship project; 5. County Conservation Organization; 6. County Agents-support and information; 7. County Tourism groups--historic old cemeteries; 8. County officials-Various Historical groups--genealogy, historic preservation, toursupportive; and 11. Senior Citizens--they are active groups, for example-retired teachers.

The above are suggestions from Bill--can you think of other groups that could at least clean up the cemetery, no matter how small or large---no matter how forgotten and neglected?

Dean Gipple's random thoughts re work of Committee for Pioneer Cemeteries:

9/25/96

We as individuals need to aggressively state our goals, and take the calculated risk of rejection. I realize we have opened the gate for much legislative concern on pioneer cemeteries and others. As you know, I get impatient waiting on a committee to reach an agreement. This is why I took the problem to the Legislature by myself. But if one man can achieve what I did, think what an organized committee could do.

I am in agreement with you that we need to keep the pressure on. However, I was reluctant to stir up too much until we got the pioneer cemeteries taken care of.

The Number 1 project is to check the law for available egress to the cemeteries. I have had much correspondence on this subject this year. I have had calls from Kentucky, Wisconsin and Illinois. My solution to the overall picture: Cities have incorporated their cemeteries and are doing as good a job as can be done. The remaining township cemeteries should all be under the management of individual "cemetery boards or associations". They should be funded from the "general county budget" rather than just the ag land. This is the basis of my complaint that the city should share the cost of the care of the cemeteries. The association should submit a complete financial statement and projected care and custody goals to the County Supervisors. They should have final say on any action.

I believe the majority of the cemeteries are under "association" care, but remember we are changing a 150-year-old law and organizing perpetual care.

Who would serve on these associations? I would start with reliable township trustees if they are interested. I would draw up legal procedures as a statewide requirement!

We as a committee can contribute nothing by having random, haphazard meetings. I believe we should have an executive board at least to have regular meetings.

Were the political science departments of colleges notified of research into solutions? I believe some plan should be presented to the Legislature the next year just to keep the subject alive.

Finances: I would hope there is grant dollars somewhere we could get to supplement the membership dues. I probably spent over \$2000 last winter putting the bill through. The motel, stamps and pictures came to \$866.00. I would like to be reimbursed for this amount. I am willing to pay the rest of it myself. If necessary that I spent time in Des Moines for further legislation, I think it no more than fair that at least motel expenses be paid by State Cemetery Assn. Money is the grease that makes the political machine move, and I was not reluctant to take care of this, but it was cash and shall not be accounted.

Volunteers 'Dig In' to Save Country Cemeteries

"OUR CHURCH CEMETERY just hadn't been taken care of," recalls Dean Gipple (pictured above) of Columbus Junction, Iowa. Little did he know when he started this labor of love to fix up the local cemetery that it would lead to a three-year campaign to pass legislation preserving pioneer cemeteries throughout the state of Iowa.

Dean's story is one of many we've heard about since our article in the May/June issue of FARMING posed the question: Who will be the caretaker of America's Rural Cemeteries? From the letters we've received, we've come to conclude that there are many volunteers hard at work preserving these sacred links with the past. But there is still much hard work to do.

The legislation that Dean initiated—and was passed and signed into law this year—shifts responsibility for the upkeep of pioneer cemeteries from township trustees to the county supervisors. The county supervisors can then appoint a county cemetery commission that will supervise and care for the pioneer cemeteries in their county.

A pioneer cemetery, by definition, is one which has had six or fewer burials in the preceding fifty years. Dean figures there are at least 3,000 in Iowa alone—many of them abandoned and lying in ruin.

Formerly, only the agricultural land in the state was taxed to care for these cemeteries. That's because when the law was established, the people whose ancestors were buried there lived mostly in rural areas.

But says Dean, "Over time, many of them moved to the cities and were no longer being taxed. Basically, in Iowa, we were operating under a law that was 150 years old!"

The new law changes that. It enables county supervisors to levy up to 6 3/4 cents per \$1,000 in property value on all property in the county—not just farmland. "We're about fifty years late in getting this law through." Dean says. "This is our history. They're not just cemeteries!

"I've shown it can be done, and I'm hoping other states will pick it up. People are interested. You've just got to show them the way."

"You don't have to be a rocket scientist to get things done," he adds.

In spite of heart problems and bouts with cancer, the 78-year-old cemetery champion has also spent time working with local 4-H clubs and FFA chapters to clean up rural cemeteries. With each cemetery that is restored, he recognizes the volunteers who help and agree to the upkeep with a bronze plaque (paid for out of his own pocket). To date, he figures he and the youth groups have repaired more than 200 tombstones.

Charles "Butch" Tharp and his brother Robert are volunteering time to restore the Farmer City Cemetery in Farmer City, Illinois. "A year ago in July, my brother and I went to a seminar on restoration of cemeteries. From that point on we were hooked!" says Butch.

"Unless it's raining, you'll usually find me up at the cemetery!" Butch adds. He's disabled and the cemetery has become a hobby to stay busy.

"The condition of the cemetery was very sad. There were a lot of stones broken, fallen over, and leaning," he continues. So he and Robert spend much of their time cleaning stones and piecing them back together. They have also reengraved some of the original pioneer stones that were nearly unreadable.

"You know, John Deere and Toro are responsible for some of the damage." Butch jokes. Careless mowing contributes to fallen and broken stones just as much as vandalism. Neglect, however, is still the main cause for the state of the cemeteries.

Epoxy to repair the stones is their biggest expense. Butch says, "If you want it to last for years, you have to use the good stuff." Unfortunately, the "good stuff' runs them more than \$400 per case.

But, that's where donations come in. "You might be surprised how people will respond when they know what you are doing," he continues. "People hear about it and say, 'Hey I've got relatives out there and I'd like for you to look at their stones'."

"It's kind of nice to have people walk up and say you're doing a good job. It makes you feel good," he adds.
